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## High Growth Small Business Job Creation Act Aggregate Statewide Report—Updated January 22, 2021

Pursuant to South Carolina Code of Laws §11-44-60, Secretary of State Mark Hammond is publishing an aggregated statewide report of qualified businesses registered under the High Growth Small Business Job Creation Act. This report includes the number of qualified businesses registered under the Act; the amount of capital raised by the businesses, including the amount of qualified investment as defined by the Act; the number of full-time, part-time, and temporary jobs created by the qualified businesses; and the average wages paid by these jobs. This aggregated statewide report is based on the information provided by the qualified businesses at the time of registration. The High Growth Small Business Job Created Act was repealed on December 31, 2019 and reenacted on May 26, 2020.
